





LATEST UPDATE By: Youseung Kim Covid-19 in Busan



Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic has not been kind to Busan nor South Korea for the past month. The virus continues to negatively impact a huge part of everybody's lives, and the numbers have been continually rising. Since last month's edition, South Korea has released one update on social distancing changes and guidelines. Then, the total number of COVID-19 cases in the country has risen to a staggering 125,000+. In Busan specifically, there were 5,100+ cases. Meanwhile, the average number of cases per day in South Korea has risen to about 450 to 700 cases per day.



In the most recent update regarding social distancing released by the South Korean government on May 3rd, the government announced that Busan will stay at level 2 social distancing. The maximum number of people that can meet together remains the same as last month, at 4. The government has also announced that its goal is to keep the number of confirmed cases per day under 1000 throughout the rest of May and June. If the number of cases is successfully maintained, the government plans to make changes to social distancing regulations starting in July.



Busan Foreign School still maintains several protocols within its campus to ensure everyone's safety, but we have not seen any major changes in recent weeks, with the school staying at its "Enhanced" level of safety learning modes.

Living as a child in Korea just a century ago was tough. While children should have a similar level of respect as adults since they have equal rights as well, the Korean society did not care about this at the time. For instance, many children were hardly even given names and



were called 'this', 'that', and other words that are usually used to refer to things. They would be called like this until late in their adolescence and finally get a name as they enter adulthood. In addition, children were told to work for long hours on the farm or out in the market to sell food. This was because children were viewed more as an investment by parents to help with the family. To modern standards, this is unbelievable but this was how life was like for the Korean kids.



From around the 1920s, voices started to rise that children also need equal rights as adults and need more respect. Hitting children in schools or at home was also criticized by many people since it was inhuman. On top of this new ideology, the various independence movements against the Japanese regime also boosted the idea that children need to be treated in a better way since society developed a theme of gaining equal rights for everyone. Finally, this resulted in possibly one of the most iconic holidays in Korean history: Children's Day.



This Month in History



Children's Day was first officially started in 1927. Originally, it was said to be scheduled on the first day of May. However, this was later changed to the 5th of May because May 1st was already the holiday for Labor Day back then. On May 5th, there was a big parade for all the children where they all came out to the streets and paraded together. This was led by Bang Jeong Hwan, who is known as the creator of Children's Day. Just like Bang Jeong Hwan predicted, Children's Day became very popular in Korea. Children poured out into the streets and celebrated the rights that they deserved and adults gave presents to children as a symbol of respect.



After Korea was liberated from Japan in 1945, Children's Day became an official holiday in Korea. On this day, children were not sent to schools and they were taken to places such as amusement parks or restaurants. With this day, laws were also established where it was prohibited to look down on children or beat them up just to the fact that they are smaller and weaker than adults.

It is shocking to know that what may seem obvious children getting their names, not being hit, and getting equal treatments as adults — was not familiar to people just a few decades ago. In this context, we can realize how important Children's Day is since this day got rid of all the discrimination that children got and elevated their dignity to modern standards.

or hundreds of years, only a single type of family was believed to be 'normal'. This is where a family would consist of two parents and children or now known as the nuclear family. According to Time, nuclear families were believed to be the only family, and other families were not considered to be families in the past. However, this is different now since the number of nuclear families is decreasing rapidly. Instead, there are many new types of families that are replacing the original nuclear families.

The first type is called the extended family. This is when relatives including uncles, aunts, cousins, or grandparents all live together with a nuclear family to ensure financial securities and help each other. For instance, this type of family has an advantage over the traditional nuclear family in that they usually have a stronger financial ability since more people are joined together. Also, this type of family is able to help family members who cannot live by themselves such as elderly members or young people who cannot live on their own just yet. Especially with current circumstances such as the coronavirus, the extended family is becoming increasingly popular with more people looking for support from their family members.

Childless families are also becoming easier to spot in societies around the world. In the past, many people have argued that the core of a family is children. Children are who continue the pedigree of that family and lead the future of the world. However, that ideology is obsolete nowadays since children are not necessarily considered to be essential for a family to form. Childless families divide into two types: voluntary and involuntary. For example, involuntary childless families form when a couple cannot have children due to biological reasons that cannot be controlled. Meanwhile, voluntary childless families, which are more common, is about the belief of a couple where they might deem that they would not wish for children. LoveToKnow, a professional website that deals with many types of families, says that more and more young couples consider that having children could take away their opportunities of caring for themselves which is why they would rather not have children.

Another type of family that is becoming more prevalent in society is grandparent family. This means that the grandparents of children will raise or mostly care for the children in place of their parents. Grandparent families have been extant as well in the past, but they are more prevalent in recent years from the increase of female employment and divorce rates. At the moment, both males and females are at a good position for being hired which means that there are more families where both parents

work. If their children are younger, they cannot take care of themselves while the parents are gone thus bringing in the grandparents for care. Another thing is that there are more divorced families which means that grandparents step in to help the single parent who raises the children. Experts say that the grandparent family will be more common in our society once life spans of people increase (grandparents are healthier for a longer time) and more families have both parents working.

There is no 'norm' for anything in 2021. This applies to how families look like and families are no longer the typical mother-father-children structure. Then, what is a family? As of today, a family can be defined as a group where the members can feel comfortable and support each other whether it may have an extension, childless, or with grandparents.






INTERVIEW WITH ANDREW LEE

Thankfully, Covid-19 has not impacted me too much. There are obvious things such as changed safety protocols, etc., however, I've not had too big of an impact.


Do you have anything you would like to say to the students?




