
The final cherry blossom spot is the Haeundae Dalmaji road.

Humans have always wanted to go higher and higher in the sky and build taller buildings. The quest for this is an ongoing process and we see numerous attempts to break the limit each year as engineers figure out ways to heighten the already-tall skyscrapers. In New York City, however, things are a little different. A building that was built over 90 years ago still stands as one of the tallest buildings in the city: the Empire State Building.

The Empire State Building was originally built to house corporate offices and be used as a workplace. However, the real intention was to build the tallest building in New York City and boast the flourishing economy at the time as well as the advancement of architectural technology in the US. At the time that the building was being planned in the 1920s, the US was in one of its best days since its foundation; money was circulating the market at a good rate and people were becoming more comfortable. Therefore, the attention of people started to shift to luxurious and extravagant goods. And one of them was new, tall buildings.

However, the Great Depression had hit America just before the building opened its doors on May 1, 1931. Therefore, most of the corporations that signed up to be in the building exited, and the building instantly became a financial flop. People mocked the building by calling names such as "Empty State Building".

Despite all the troubles that the building had to go through, the Empire State Building is undeniably one of the most iconic constructions in America. Currently, the building isn't used primarily for offices as it was supposed to be. While there are still nine office spaces that are being used, most of the gigantic building is being used for tourism. Many facilities have appeared and disappeared at the building with hotels, restaurants, theaters, and amusement parks all coming and leaving the building. From this, it is expected that the Empire State Building will maintain its glory at least for the time being, and pack much more greatness for New York City in the future.




AFTER 10 YEARS!



One clear-skied afternoon during the Highschool Boys Futsal practice, a monumental event in BFS futsal and outdoor field history occurred. On April 19th, 2022, one of the windows in the cafeteria that overlooks the field, shattered. Yes, shattered. The upper left corner of this particular window was struck by a kicked futsal ball and as a result, cracks webbed out from the origin of impact, and shards of glass were dispersed in the general vicinity while the second layer of the double-paned glass prevented shards from entering the cafeteria.

This window had sustained 10 years of impact from balls and other objects. The person who kicked the ball, Danil Galkin (a.k.a. goalie superstar), claimed to not even have kicked the it that hard, saying that "it was just the perfect angle I guess." Onlookers and witnesses displayed many emotions including surprise, wonder, and amusement. One person said that this was the "first time I've ever seen this happen."


Thankfully nobody was harmed and our hard-working bus drivers/custodians were able to swiftly respond to the scene and erect stanchions in order to cordon off the area. Although the broken first layer of the window was removed by the following day, throughout the next couple of weeks, the futsal goal on the cafeteria side of the field was not open to use as the danger of breaking the weaker second layer of the double-paned window was at risk. This hindered the use of the field by all grade levels including the high school futsal teams—limiting the space accessible by half.

THE DISAPPEARANCE COOPER

On the 24th of November, 1971, a man who went by the alias of Dan B. Cooper bought an airplane ticket for the Northwest Orient Airlines in Portland, Oregon. The ticket he bought was a one-way ticket bound for Seattle in Washington, and he paid with cash. Little did the airline know, but this was the beginning to one of the greatest unsolved mysteries in the FBI's history.





The flight attendants recalled that Cooper was a quiet man, wearing a business suit with a black tie and white undershirt, and seemed to be in his mid- forties. It was a little bit after 3:00 that Cooper put his plan into motion, and called over a stewardess. Upon calling her over, he handed her a note, stating that he had a bomb in the briefcase he carried. The note also called for the stewardess to sit down with him. She did as told, and was especially stunned when he leaned down to open the briefcase, showing her a mass of jumbled wires of red and blue. Upon showing her that he meant serious business, he gave her a slip of paper, and told her to write down his demands. On the slip of paper, he demanded four parachutes, and twenty-dollar bills amounting to a whopping \$200,000.

Upon landing in Seattle, Cooper exchanged the 36 passengers on board for the parachutes and the money, but kept some of the crew on board, telling them to take off and head for Mexico City. A bit after 8:00 pm, when the plane was somewhere between Reno and Seattle, he jumped out of the plane, with the parachute and ransom money attached to him person. The flight crew said that he jumped out over woody lands, which is something hard for even professionals to land safely in without injury, especially at night without a light. The plane landed safely in Mexico City, but the whereabouts of D.B Cooper and his ultimate fate remains unknown.

Upon learning about the case, the FBI opened an investigation. Over the course of 5 years, over 800 people were named suspects, and the FBI couldn't even close to figure out what could have happened to the money.

What do you think happened? Did D.B Cooper die as he landed in the woods? Or did he manage to pull off one of the greatest hijackings that left even the FBI stunned?
