Fortunately, BFS students have access to a weekend tennis program right on the school campus. The large field is perfectly convertible to full-size tennis courts where students are able to do a full practice and play matches. Other equipment like nets, racquets, balls, and cones are also prepared, so students can simply come to school and start playing right away.

The students are taught by Coach Rojas and Val Kim (Gr. 10). Coach Rojas is a professional tennis player who once represented his country in the Davis Cup. Val is a competitive tennis player who aims to play tennis in college. Together, they make sure that each student receives individualized attention on their swings and forms.





Most of the current students started out as complete beginners in August. However, they have now fully developed their forehand and backhand swings, the most fundamental elements of tennis. Some of the players have even developed higher-level techniques such as slices and volleys. Therefore, classes are now planned mostly with games and matches to help students to practice the skills that they already have.

The famous Nightmare Before Christmas nearly wasn't produced into the movie we know and love today, as it was a rocky journey to even get it into production. Disney had originally mulled over the idea of turning Tim Burton's poem into an 80's TV show special, but they eventually backed out of the idea. What gave Tim Burton the power to negotiate the production of his poem, however, was the previous success of Beetlejuice, released in 1988, and Edward Scissorhands, released in 1990. These successes allowed Tim Burton to get his movie project a thumbs up to go, but upon seeing the first trailer, the then CEO Michael Eisner decided that the movie did not fit Disney's typical style and was too "dark" for their usual audience. This is not the end of the story, however, as production was switched from Disney to Touchstone Pictures, which is where Disney sends the movies they "don't want to be associated with their child-friendly brand".

The film was created with stop motion animation at a painstaking 24 frames per second. It's no wonder that the movie took three years to complete, as a single minute of footage took a week to produce. The animation result was a wonder for its time, and despite its rocky road to production, we were still able to enjoy an amazing movie that combines two cultures people love together. Now we can only ask if there will ever be another movie that successfully combines two holidays and retains relevance for years as well as this age-old movie.



SOUTH KOREA HAS GROWN AT A RAPID RATE THAT THE WORLD HAS NEVER SEEN BEFORE. JUST A FEW DECADES AGO, SOUTH KOREA WAS ONE OF THE POOREST COUNTRIES IN THE WORLD, SUFFERING FROM COLONIZATION AND WAR. THERE WAS BARELY ANY INFRASTRUCTURE LEFT IN THE COUNTRY AND THE GOVERNMENT WAS ALSO TORN APART. IT WAS FIRST SET IN 1956 AFTER THE KOREAN WAR WHERE MOST OF THE CASUALTIES OF THE KOREAN ARMY TOOK PLACE. JUST FROM THE KOREAN WAR IN 1950, IT WAS CALCULATED THAT AROUND 130,000 SOLDIERS PASSED AWAY DURING THE WAR. THE SOLDIERS WHO WERE INJURED ALSO TALLIED UP TO 450,000. A SUBSTANTIAL PERCENTAGE OF THE PASSED AWAY SOLDIERS HAVE STILL NOT BEEN FOUND AND THE MILITARY CONTINUOUSLY WORKS TO DISCOVER THE REMAINS OF THE UNFOUND SOLDIERS.

ON THE MORNING OF MEMORIAL DAY, CITIZENS ARE ENCOURAGED TO HANG THE KOREAN FLAG OUTSIDE OF THEIR HOUSES AND PRAY FOR THE SOLDIERS IN SILENCE FOR ONE MINUTE AS SIRENS ARE PLAYED ON THE STREET. MANY PEOPLE ALSO WATCH THE ANNUAL COMMEMORATION CEREMONIES WHERE THE PRESIDENT GOES TO THE GRAVES OF THE DECEASED SOLDIERS AND GIVES A SPEECH.

ANYONE CAN FEEL PAIN AND FEAR. THIS IS NO EXCEPTION FOR SOLDIERS. HOWEVER, SOLDIERS HAVE NO OPTION BUT TO COMMIT TO THESE NATURAL FEELINGS AND MUST ENDURE THE FEAR OF DYING ANYTIME. IN ADDITION, SOLDIERS HAVE ALWAYS BEEN ESSENTIAL TO A COUNTRY'S WELL-BEING AND THEIR BRAVERY IN SACRIFICING FOR ALL THE OTHERS IS WHAT PROTECTS A FLOURISHING COUNTRY. THEREFORE, IT IS NECESSARY THAT WE REMEMBER THEM AND MAKE SURE THAT THEY ARE REVERED FOREVER.
